The students have to register online for taking the admission and pay the fees only in online mode after the generation of payment receipt after successfully completing the admission procedure. Results are also generated inhouse by the MIS software. This has led to reduction in the time period of Result Declaration. The students progress including their attendance is conveyed to the Parents through MIS. Salary of faculty members is drawn through the MIS software SEVARTH provided by the Government of Maharashtra. Every teacher is provided with Email ID by the National Information Commission (NIC) and all upward and downward communication is done through these

CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS**1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation**

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The Ismail Yusuf College has following mechanism for effective delivery of curriculum

- 1) The Departmental Meetings are held at the beginning of an academic year and the topics in the syllabus are distributed to the faculty members. The provision of teachers required to be appointed on the Clock Hour Basis, if any, is communicated to the Principal. It ensures effective completion of curriculum.
- 2) The Timetable of the individual faculty member along with the overall Departmental timetable is submitted in the College Office and is also displayed on the Notice Board.
- 3) Principal carries out regular appraisal of curricular activity along with the respective Heads of the Departments.
- 4) If any new topic is included in the syllabus, the requirement of reference Books is immediately communicated to the library.
- 5) Library is well equipped with more than 82000 books and journals, Students and faculty members have access to two big reading rooms in the library to update themselves about the curriculum. All faculty members are registered on INFLIBNET- NLIST. It provided them an access to huge online database.
- 6) The following teaching methodology adopted by the faculty according to the need of the subject, also plays important role in effective delivery of the curriculum
 - a) Chalk & Board Method
 - b) ICT or software enabled teaching
 - c) Use of Scientific Charts & Models
 - d) Creation of Whatsapp group to disseminate notes and course content
 - e) Adequate Instrumentation facility is provided in the laboratories for effective completion of Practicals in the Science Departments
 - f) Need based surveys and field visits are arranged by the Departments as per the curriculum.
 - g) The infrastructure is provided for completion of Project work & Dissertations to be submitted as a part of fulfillment of their degree.
 - h) Seminars, Guest Talks & Hands-on training programs are also arranged regularly for advance studies. Regular classroom evaluation, Mid semester examination, regular assessment during practicals are done to keep the track on the effective implementation of curriculum. Remedial classes and coaching is conducted for the academically weaker students. All students who are appearing for the ATKT Examinations, receives such remedial training to improve their performance in the examination. Such practices resulted in the improvement of performance in ATKT Examination by almost 40%
- 7) Towards the end of the Academic Year when entire country was brought to standstill by COVID-19 pandemic. Teaching & Examination became the daunting job. The college immediately shifted to Online Teaching by adopting to various online teaching platforms like Google Meet, Zoom, Microsoft Teams etc. The College also purchased Zoom software for classes with more than 100 capacity. The purchased version was shared by different departments as per their need.
- 9) Online Examinations were conducted as per the instructions from the University.

The college is struggling with acute staff crunch as vacancies had climbed up to almost 50 . Each teacher was providing counselling to students during their online classes. Attention was provided for their academic improvement, examinations, career options, opportunities for higher education along with addressing their psychological needs. Parent teachers meet were organised at departmental level where issues like academic performances attendance of students was primarily discussed. Many parents have contact details of faculty members and are in constant touch via whatsapp. Academically weak students are encouraged to attend extra lectures.

Evaluation pattern for all the courses is as per the instructions of Mumbai University. Few academic programs like BAF, BMS, Biotechnology, Computer Science have Internal Exams as a part of their Semester examinations. These internal exams are conducted in form of MCQ,s/Seminars/Presentations during the regular curriculum. Foundation Course from Semester I to IV UG students has project submission as a part of their Examination. Final year students of Biotechnology, M.Com., MSc students have project work which is continuously been evaluated during the entire semester. Co-curricular activities, Field Visits, Projects also are informal tools for continuous evaluation of students performances. History Political Science Departments have organized Heritage Walks with the same intentions. Activities like Hands on training also encourages students to learn some skills over and above the curriculum.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

Examinations were conducted as per the schedule during the semester I/III/V of academic year 2019-20. It was during the Semester II/IV/VI examination, the lockdown was imposed and all examinations were cancelled after 16th March 2020. Most of the papers for these examinations could not be conducted due to the lockdown. The results for students from Semester I to IV was declared on the basis of their results in previous examinations, as per the Mumbai University guidelines. The Online MCQ based Examination was conducted for Semester VI students (UG courses) Semester IV (PG courses) at the college level strictly as per the University guidelines. Mumbai University has created clusters of colleges and the examination was to be conducted at the cluster level under the guidance from Lead College. The Ismail Yusuf College was declared as a Lead College by the University and all the Online Examination were conducted in the cluster under its guidance and consultation.

Examination and Evaluation

All the rules laid down by University of Mumbai are followed for examination and evaluation too. 1) Exam Committee is constituted at the beginning of academic year. The committee conducts meetings regularly to plan the exam related work meticulously. Detailed guidelines and schedule for Supervision and Assessment work are given to individual teacher in the form of a printed table. This ensures proper discipline during examinations as well as uniformity in the assessment method. 2) Head of the Departments are asked to submit the 3 sets of question papers in sealed envelopes. The papers are selected randomly by the Principal one day before the examination. It maintains secrecy in the Examination.

The semester end examination in academic year was conducted for the first time on online mode. Multiple meeting were conducted regarding the planning of Online Examination and it was conducted without glitches. 3)

Assessment of papers in CAP (Centralized Assessment Program) is compulsory for all. Moderation is carried out wherever required by external experts as per the rules of the University. Online Examination were conducted on Google Form and results were submitted along with the Google worksheet. 4) All the rules and regulations prescribed by University are followed. Physically disabled students / students with learning disabilities are given proper facilities like separate seating, additional time as well as grace marks in the examinations. 5) Photocopies of examined/moderated papers are always given to students, on demand. 6) Facility of re evaluation is available as per the guidelines of the University.

Curriculum Development

The College is affiliated to the University of Mumbai, the syllabi is prescribed by the University. However, as members of Board of Studies the faculty members contribute to the Syllabus. Some faculty members are Chairpersons / Members of Syllabus Committees of the University of Mumbai.

Some Faculty members attend Syllabus Revision Workshops in their respective subjects and make suggestions to the panel and thus contribute to curriculum development.

Admission of Students

Admissions for all courses in the College are purely done as per the guidelines issued by the University of Mumbai and the Government of Maharashtra from time to time. The College practices a fair means of admissions and does not deprive any student from getting admission to the course based on religion, caste, community, gender etc. No seats are reserved for management quota. All admissions are done on the merit. The college does not offer seats to any programme on the basis of donations/recommendations. The college has an inclusive admission policy catering to diverse students' groups with the following reservation as stipulated by the Act: (1) 13 for SC, (2) 10 for ST, (3) 26 for OBC (non-creamy layer), and (4) 3 for special category that includes children of parents who have been transferred from other places, students who have participated in cultural and sports events, etc. (5) 3 additional quota for Persons with Disabilities (PwDs). Since the Academic Year 2014-15, the College has introduced the system of Online Admission whereby the students can fill up admission forms 24X7 from anywhere and the data base so created helps in speedy and smooth implementation of the admission process.

Teaching and Learning

The Ismail Yusuf College is aiming to convert all classrooms into Smart Classrooms by the year 2025. The College has acquired 10 Smart Classroom sets in 2019-20 and is planning to acquire 11 more in next Academic year. The College is planning to submit the proposal to equip rest of the classroom in Smart Classrooms to RUSA. The use of ICT in the teaching-learning process becomes more effective with use of smart rooms. Academically weak Students are identified during the regular classes and based on their performance in the examination. They are guided in order to improve upon their weak areas and help them to better their performance in examinations. Mentorship Program is

offered in an informal way and is usually need based. It also to an extent help to maximize the potential of students. Many departments organized Skills Development workshops in order to inculcate effective study habits among the Students. The effective understanding of syllabus of self-financed courses like BMS,BAF and Biotechnology, industrial visits are organized to make them understand the various facets of commercial activities. All science departments take their students for excursions and field visits at various places. Seminars and workshops are also organized by departments with reference to current affairs and career options. Hands on training are also provided for sophisticated instruments like HPTLC, GC-MS, AAS, RT-PCR by Science Departments to provide exposure to students about latest technology. Students perform experiments and few of them also present and publish their work in Competitions/Conferences.

Research and Development

1. IQAC played a pivotal role in organizing two International E-Conferences, 03 National level webinars a seven days FDP during the lockdown period. These conferences gave real impetus to research activities in college. Many students faculty members presented their research work and benefited from these activities. 2. Hands on training programs was conducted in HPTLC which resulted in 7 students participating their research work in Avishkar research competition. Hands on training was also conducted by Chemistry, Physics Zoology Departments. 3. IQAC motivated faculty members to present papers in National and International conferences and to publish books and articles in peer reviewed journals with impact factor. 4. The library has added more number of books, journals, e- books and e-journals for promoting research in students and faculties. 5. Faculties are encouraged to apply for minor and major projects. 07 MRP were submitted for financial assistance out of which 05 minor projects received financial assistance.

Miyawaki Urban Dense Forest: Ismail Yusuf College with the active help from Department of Botany has initiated an innovative concept of Dense Urban Forest based on Japanese technique of Miyawaki Forest. More than 1250 plants of 32 native tree species were sown in approximately 2000 Sq ft area. The Miyawaki Urban Dense Forest project was implemented through CSR scheme of HDFC Life on 22nd August 2019. Within a year the saplings attained the height of more than 6 fts. The Urban Forest project of college is one of the best such project in the city. Mural : One of the most extensive mural of Mumbai is painted on the highway facing wall of the college which has become the famous landmark of the city. It is spread over 800 ft long wall and more than 70 ft in height. Various facets of life in Mumbai, various landmarks, personalities are depicted in the Mural. A selfie point with I LOVE JOGESHWARI is also made near the mural. It has become an attraction among the crowd. Shooting Range: The College has one of the oldest NCC Corps in Mumbai. Many cadets take up uniformed services bringing great laurel to the College and the community as a whole. Ismail Yusuf College is the only College in Mumbai with Modern Shooting Range for NCC Students. No other college has such facility for NCC Cadets.
