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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Ismail Yusuf College, known as I.Y. College, is a prestigious multi-faculty institution managed by the Government of Maharashtra. Established in 1930, it is the oldest college in North Mumbai and the fourth oldest in the city. The college is set on a verdant 54-acre campus that offers a beautiful natural environment.

Currently, College enrolls above four thousand students across Junior, Degree, Post-graduate, and Research levels in Arts, Science, and Commerce. Many students are first-generation learners from socially and economically disadvantaged backgrounds. Teaching staff is actively involved in various university bodies like Academic Council, Management Council, Senate, Faculty of Commerce & Management, BoS Chairperson, BoS Members, and MHRD nominee of First Court in Central University. 183 research articles were published in reputable national and international journals, with 80 appearing in UGC Care-listed publications during the last 5 years. The college has been to its credit ten patent publications, copyrights and IPR for its contributions to research and development.

Over the past five years, College has organized six international and national conferences, alongside 146 seminars, workshops, and talks. The college also conducted 99 outreach programs through committees like the NCC, NSS, and DLLE, fostering student development.

The college library boasts a large collection of books, journals, and rare manuscripts, complemented by seven air-conditioned computer labs and a Computer Resource Centre to enhance students' digital skills. The science labs are equipped with high-end precision instruments.

Culturally, the college hosts a two-day festival titled "PALMS," which successfully transitioned online during the pandemic, upholding its tradition of annual events. The College has a large sports ground spread over 8 acres of land and a Gymkhana building that houses a gymnasium, badminton court, and facilities for yoga and aerobics.

College is proud of its distinguished alumni, including notable figures such as former Chief Minister A.R. Antulay and renowned Marathi author P.L. Deshpande. Its alumni have received prestigious awards, including one Padma Bhushan and two Padma Shree honors, along with six President's Awards.

Looking ahead, the college plans to establish a Skill Development Centre, Incubation Centre, Commerce Bhavan, and a Biodiversity Park, further enhancing its educational offerings.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The College is affiliated to the University of Mumbai and adheres to the prescribed curriculum, structure and academic calendar set forth by the university. The College offers 07 UG, 10 PG and 6 PhD programs in Arts, Science & Commerce streams. The faculty members participate in activities related to curriculum development and assessment of the affiliated University. They are also involved in curriculum development through their participation in Academic councils, Management Council, Senate, Board of Studies Chairperson, Member, BoS, and Syllabus framing committees. They are also in involved in Paper Setting and Assessment of University examinations. Each Head of Department/Coordinators, conducts departmental meetings to plan and coordinate activities with other staff members. All the HODs/coordinators ensure that the syllabus is properly taught and completed before the semester end examination. For slow learners, remedial lectures with focus on addressing the specific learning needs of the learners in question are arranged. Continuous monitoring of the students is implemented through internal assessment in form of quizzes, group discussions alongside formal evaluations through projects, assignments, and class tests as per university guidelines. The college prepares academic calendar and faculty adopts student centric pedagogy methods.

89 Certificate and Value-added courses were offered in offline and online mode. Many of these courses were conducted under MoU by TISS-NUSSD and IIRS-ISRO program. The syllabi prescribed by the University of Mumbai addresses the relevance and need for incorporating crosscutting issues by integrating them into the curriculum. 282 programs were arranged during the assessment period to enrich students with wide variety of extra and co-curricular activities. These diverse activities are designed to provide a holistic educational experience that address crosscutting issues effectively.

259 computers, 07 Air-conditioned Computer labs and 31 smartboards are installed to augment and strengthen ICT teaching pedagogy. 33 Field visits were organised to provide wider exposure and understanding of industry, economy, history and habitat.

Feedback from students, parents, teachers, alumni, and recruiters is collected and analyzed. The data procured, thus, becomes a part of the procedure through which amendments are made to infrastructure and facilities under the IQAC.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The College is committed to an interactive teaching-learning process that fosters academic enrichment and supports holistic development. It prioritizes the needs of learners for both academic and overall growth. Qualified faculty are recruited according to UGC norms through the Maharashtra State Public Commission (MPSC) to ensure high educational standards. Core Faculty for self-financed courses and clock-hour positions are appointed by Principal following established guidelines.

The College follows CBCS pattern as prescribed by the University of Mumbai. The College enrolls students as per the approved sanctioned strength and reservation policies of Government of Maharashtra on merit. If demand for specific courses increases, the University may grant 10% additional seats upon receiving a proposal from College.

To support diverse learners, teachers implement a variety of inclusive approaches, including mentor-mentee programs, bridge course, remedial support for slow learners, counselling sessions, classroom activities, and peer learning opportunities. Advanced learners are recognized during the Annual Day celebrations and are provided with additional resources, including extra books on their library cards. Provisions are made for physically challenged students in the infrastructure. The result of college is higher than the University average.

The College boasts robust ICT infrastructure, with 31 smartboards across classrooms and labs. Staff also participate in basic and advanced ICT training programmes. Computer Science department conducted special ICT sessions for teaching staff during the lockdown.

Ismail Yusuf College hosted an MS-DEED workshop on modern teaching tools, with selected staff later attending the Level 2 Master Trainer Programme at IISER Pune. Ismail Yusuf College hosted a Maharashtra State Development of Educators and Enhancement in Delivery (MS-DEED) Workshop for educators on modern teaching tools, followed by selected staff attending the residential Level 2 Master Trainer Programme at IISER Pune.

Additionally, the College organizes special talks, seminars, workshops, and panel discussions to provide experiential learning and exposure to practical advancements in research.

The College follows the University of Mumbai's examination patterns and reforms, implementing continuous internal and external evaluations for all undergraduate and postgraduate courses. Continuous Internal Evaluation of students is done through techniques like presentations, debates/discussions, case studies, role play, field visits, projects and research presentations/papers.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college has well defined research policy which supports a vibrant research culture among the staff and students. Central Research Facility in Science Building reflects our effort to promote collaborative research and develop research ecosystem. IQAC played a major role in securing substantial government grants to augment

its research infrastructure. We have six research centers and nine PhD guides, with 18 students having successfully completed their PhDs and 22 currently pursuing their degrees. 182 research papers were published and 80 of them were published in UGC Care listed journals. 83 books/chapters were edited by the faculty members during the assessment period. 6 national and international level conferences were conducted. 58 workshops and seminars were also conducted to enhance learning beyond the classroom.

College has also entered into 26 MoUs/Collaborations which provided access to resources, expertise, and networking opportunities. This collaboration has facilitated knowledge exchange through conferences, hands-on training, certificate courses, workshops and seminars and helped to improve academic quality. Soft skills and value-added courses were also conducted under MoU with NUSSD-TISS with an aim to increase the employability of students.

Faculty members are life members of the professional bodies and agencies. Faculty members are often appointed as government nominees and observers for various educational initiatives, leading to informal consultancy opportunities, allowing teachers to share their expertise and insights beyond the classroom.

The College has active NCC, NSS and DLLE cells which places a strong emphasis on the holistic development of students by engaging in community service that generates moral awareness and a sense of responsibility. These cells conducted 107 extension activities that support confidence and self-esteem, helping students develop a sense of identity and purpose. NCC Cadets of College Unit are regularly selected for prestigious Republic Day Parade, almost every year. Our college achieved a rare feat on 26th January 2020 when six NCC cadets in RD parade are selected from a same battalion.

Through these initiatives, the institute empowers both faculty and students, cultivating a dynamic ecosystem of research, innovation, and community service. This integrated approach enhances academic growth while instilling a strong sense of social responsibility.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The College is situated on a lush 54-acre campus, a rarity in the bustling city of Mumbai, providing serene environment for learning. It boasts 47 lecture rooms, 27 laboratories, 7 computer labs, a library, reading rooms, and an 8-acre open ground, along with a fully equipped gymnasium and sports complex. The AC auditorium and open-air auditorium further enhance the infrastructure, ensuring a rich and impactful learning experience.

Separate buildings for the Arts, Science, and Commerce faculties streamline academic activities. Commerce classes take place in the Main and Annex Building, while the Arts faculty operates out of the Bhasha Bhawan, and Science classes are held in both the New and Old Science Buildings. The college is continuously enhancing its ICT capabilities, featuring 31 smartboards, 259 computers, and robust Wi-Fi with 100 Mbps internet speed supporting an efficient learning environment.

The library offers an extensive collection of over 80,000 books across various subjects and languages, including Arabic, English, Gujarati, Hindi, Marathi, Persian, Sanskrit, and Urdu. In addition to its vast holdings, the library subscribes to more than 50 journals and magazines, 9 daily newspapers in four languages, and 915 rare books. The N-LIST database, provided by INFLIBNET, is also accessible to faculty and students following registration.

The sports complex includes a well-equipped gymnasium, an indoor badminton hall, and facilities for yoga and

aerobics. The expansive playground is used for outdoor sports such as cricket and football, and the basketball court has recently been renovated.

Notably, the NCC Unit at the college features Mumbai's only dedicated firing range and a 10-course obstacle track. Each year, cadets are selected to participate in the prestigious Republic Day parade in New Delhi.

In recent years, the College has received the grant of approximately Rs.32 crore for infrastructure development and maintenance. A grant of Rs.6.69 crore has been approved for ongoing renovations, while a separate Rs.5.53 crore grant has been allocated for constructing an Incubation Centre, Computer Centre, Skill Development Centre, and Reading Room, with work already underway.

Student Support and Progression

The majority of our students come from Socially and Economically Disadvantaged Groups (SEDG). To support them, the college provides comprehensive information about scholarship and freeship opportunities offered by State and Central Government during the induction program, where students can submit online applications. Special lectures are held to raise awareness about available financial support. The College has also provided fees deduction during the COVID-19 pandemic. Additionally, the college offers fee concessions and installment plans for economically weaker students. Many students are applying for non-governmental scholarships through the Kalsekar and Keserbaug Trusts, with the Malabar Trust also recently starting to offer scholarships. In total 6543 students benefitted by scholarship and freeship with Rs. 1.24 crore in the assessment period.

Safety is a priority on campus, with an extensive CCTV network of about 220 cameras monitored from a central server, capable of storing footage for over 30 days. The government has approved Rs.2.5 crore to upgrade this system to 400 cameras. A Police Chowki on campus enhances security and helps maintain discipline. The college enforces strict anti-ragging policies and promotes programs that foster a welcoming and safe environment for all students.

To ensure a smooth transition from college to the workforce, the college places a strong emphasis on placement support. A dedicated placement cell organizes job fairs, placement drives, and career counselling sessions, helping students to find internships and job opportunities. Many students' pursuit post graduate courses as well. The employment landscape in Mumbai is vibrant, leading to a low unemployment rate among graduates.

The college also promotes sports and cultural activities to support holistic student development. Students have the opportunity to participate in competitions at the university, national, and international levels, proudly representing the institution. Over the past few years, 14 students have competed in national-level sports tournaments. The college also hosts various university and district-level competitions, providing motivation and opportunities for students. Additionally, students engage in extension activities through NSS, DLLE, and NCC, contributing to their overall growth and community involvement.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The college is dedicated to impart quality, value-based education that fosters the holistic growth of students. Its governance structure, mandated by the Government of Maharashtra, promotes a democratic, collective, and participatory decision-making process, encouraging active involvement from all stakeholders in achieving

institutional goals. Decentralization is key to effective governance; thus, the Principal forms both statutory and non-statutory committees at the beginning of each academic year, based on faculty members' core competencies, aptitude and commitment. The college offers numerous opportunities for professional development for both teaching and non-teaching staff, 159 staff members benefited from these initiatives.

E-governance is integrated in all key areas of operation. The college has procured MasterSoft Digital ERP Solutions to manage admissions, examinations, and results. The implementation of tamperproof mark sheets represents a significant step towards enhancing the security and reliability of academic records. Administrative functions are streamlined using government portals such as SEVARTH, GEM, PFMS, and MKCL/SAMARTH for salary management, purchasing, university admissions, and payments. Faculty performance appraisals are conducted online via the SPARROW-MahaPAR portal. The college has internal and external audit systems to ensure accountability and continuous improvement. During assessment period, it conducted Academic, Gender, Library, Green, Energy, and Environmental audits.

The college continually assesses its infrastructure needs and actively seeks financial support from the State Government, securing approximately Rs.32 crore for development and maintenance. Advanced equipment such as HPTLC, HPLC, UPLC, GC-MS, LC-MS, AAS, UV Spectrophotometer, FTIR, and RAMAN have been procured to enhance the academic experience.

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) plays a crucial role in analyzing prevailing scenarios and motivating both staff and students to engage in various programs aimed at holistic development. During the lockdown, the ICT infrastructure was immediately upgraded, and special sessions were organized for online classes and examinations. The college offers certificate courses, guest lectures, and remedial classes as needed to ensure a smooth transition through the curriculum.

Furthermore, IQAC encourages departments and committees to establish Memorandums of Understanding (MoUs) and collaborations with other institutions, organizations, and NGOs. These partnerships facilitate skill enhancement training programs, conferences, workshops, seminars, and lectures, bridging the gap between academia and industry.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The college has arranged 282 activities during the assessment period, touching upon all the aspects of holistic education which were aimed at instilling values of tolerance, harmony, and patriotism, while fostering an inclusive environment that embraces diversity and promotes socially responsible citizenship.

Gender equality is actively addressed through formal curriculum delivery and various gender-related activities. Academic and gender audits have been conducted to evaluate and enhance the educational environment, ensuring inclusivity throughout the college.

Environmental consciousness is a top priority, reflected in initiatives such as the planting of over 10,000 saplings under the Miyawaki Urban Forest program, the installation of 140 kW of solar panels, and water harvesting systems of 1,47,750 Ltrs. Green, Energy, and Environment Audits underscore the college's commitment towards its green initiatives and sustainable practices. Cleanliness drives, plastic collection initiatives, and tree planting activities are regularly organized to engage students and the community in fostering a cleaner, greener campus and encourage a culture of responsibility towards the environment.

The college has established a committee to celebrate commemorative days and anniversaries of important personalities, in accordance with the Maharashtra Government's guidelines. This committee is responsible for organizing events and activities that honor significant figures and historical events, inculcating a deeper understanding of their contributions and promoting cultural awareness among students. Through these celebrations, the college aims to instill values of respect and appreciation for diverse legacies within the community. Additionally, the Hindi, Marathi, Urdu, Arabic, and Persian departments conduct a series of events each year to promote linguistic and cultural diversity, as well as multilingualism.

Among the college's best practices are green initiatives like the Miyawaki Forest, an Animal Rescue Team, a Newspaper Club, tamperproof mark sheets, the longest murals in the Mumbai suburbs, and a dedicated firing range and obstacle track for NCC cadets. These initiatives reflect the college's commitment to holistic development and community engagement.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	The college is well equipped to offer multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary approach envisaged in the NEP's directives. The college currently offers 23 UG, PG & PhD academic programs. There are 23 Departments across Arts (12), Science (08), and Commerce (03) streams to implement interdisciplinary approach by incorporated in the University syllabus. The syllabus provides variety of elective courses under each programme. The first and second years of all undergraduate programmes has Foundation Course with a
	multidisciplinary approach. This course integrates topics from both humanities and sciences, covering
	areas such as Economics, Political Science,

	Psychology, and Environmental Science. The syllabus includes topics like the Indian Constitution, various aspects of political processes, Globalization and Indian Society, Liberalization, Privatization, and Human Rights as well as Ecology, Stress and Conflict Management in contemporary society. The University has implemented NEP-2020 schemes for the PG programs from 2022-23 which was effectively implemented by the college. The college also intends to align with the guidelines of the National Education Policy (NEP) by augmenting its infrastructure to address multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary aspect. Construction of a big computer lab with at least 100 PC capacity, Reading room, Skill Development Centre and Incubation Centre is going on in full swing. The College has received the grant of Rs 5.53 crore for the same.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	The college has prepared a roadmap to achieve 100% enrolment in ABC. Beginning with the 2023-24 academic year, ABC ID is also included in the Admission Form. To assist students to register in ABC, the college has provided a detailed guide on "How to Generate ACADEMIC BANK OF CREDITS (ABC) Account on DigiLocker Portal" on the website. (https://ismailyusufcollege.ac.in/NoticeB oard/How%20to%20create%20ABC%20ID%20I%20 Y%20COLLEGE.pdf). The same is also being distributed on the students' WhatsApp group. The significance of having an ABC ID is highlighted during the Induction Session for first-year students. This introduction ensures that new students understand the value and benefits of the Academic Bank of Credits system from the start of their academic journey. By familiarizing them with how to use their ABC ID effectively, the college aims to achieve 100% enrollment. Plans are on to integrate ABC ID's on the mark sheets and further instructions on that matter is issue is awaited from the University. The College has nearly achieved about 90% registration of second year and third year students on ABC portal. Students are using their ABC ID's to register on SWAYAM/NPTEL courses.
3. Skill development:	The College has received a big boost and significant support from the State Government to advance our Skill Development initiatives. We have been granted substantial funding for two key projects: Rs.1.49 crore for the construction of a Skill Development

	Centre and Rs.1.7 crore for an Incubation Centre. These funds were sanctioned by the District Planning Committee (DPC), Mumbai Suburban, and work orders for these projects were issued last year. To augment our skill development efforts, we have established partnerships through MoUs with renowned organizations. From the academic year 2019-20 to 2022-23, we collaborated with the Tata Institute of Social Sciences and their National University Students' Skill Development Programme (TISS-NUSSD) to offer various diploma courses, including: • Diploma in e-Commerce and Digital Marketing • Diploma in Banking and Financial Services • Diploma in Entrepreneurship • Diploma in Export and Import Management • Certificate Course in Management and Soft Skills These programs saw a total enrollment of 703 students. Additionally, we entered into an MoU with the Antarang Foundation, which conducted the CareeReady (CR) program in the academic year 2019-20, benefiting 219 students. Our students also had the opportunity to enroll in courses offered by the United Nations Women and PRADAN. Beyond these partnerships, we have actively conducted a variety of add-on and certificate courses to further enhance our students' skills and employability. From 2019-20 to 2022-23, we offered 89 certificate courses, which were attended by 5,356 students. These initiatives are part of our ongoing commitment to providing valuable skills and opportunities to our students, helping them to succeed in their careers and beyond.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	NEP has crystallized Indian Knowledge System (IKS) into the curriculum in the first semester of all UG courses. It presents a unique opportunity to enrich students' learning experiences by blending traditional wisdom with contemporary practices. IQAC has organised a training session for faculties who were delivering the IKS content. The need was emphasised to include some real life examples, case studies and videos to showcase IKS in action. Faculties were instructed to organise visits to CSM Museum, historical locations like Kanheri Caves, Jogeshwari caves and local centers of traditional arts and sciences to provide hands-on experience. Activities especially focused on IKS like essay contests, debate, or quiz competitions were also planned. It was also decided to hire faculty from

	other streams for conducting these lecture. The college also offers other IKS programs, such as Ancient Indian Culture (AIC) and Islamic Studies. Additionally, the college is planning to revive courses in Indian Languages like Sanskrit and Pali. Furthermore, the college is actively collaborating with Uttan Vanaushadhi Sanshodhan Sanstha, Kesavsrushti, to conduct analysis and standardization of herbal formulations based on Ayurveda. Notably, the college boasts an impressive collection of more than 150 medicinal plants within its campus, which likely plays a pivotal role in the research and study of herbal formulations. This multifaceted approach to education, encompassing traditional knowledge systems, language revival, and botanical research, showcases the college's commitment to holistic and diverse learning opportunities.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): As an affiliated college of University of Mumbai, PO & PSO are clearly stated in the syllabus. At the begining of each semester, the college actively seeks feedback from students to gauge their expectations regarding the learning outcomes of the program. This process is followed by another round of feedback collection at the end of the semester. The design of these feedback mechanisms is carefully structured to comprehensively evaluate the potential of the syllabus, teaching methods, learning experiences, and evaluation processes. Furthermore, the feedback outcomes hold significant importance as they are shared with the University and the relevant Board of Studies. During the assessment of these feedback results, a fair and balanced approach is adopted. The IQAC has also initiated the task to evaluate the attainment of Course Outcomes (CO) and Programme Outcomes (PO). The College has effectively implemented the Outcome Based Education (OBE) strategy and mapped CO's and PO's starting with BAF program. The same exercise will be replicated across all the programs by the end this academic year.
6. Distance education/online education:	The college, serving as a Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University (YCMOU) (Center No. 31399), has experienced significant growth and expansion over recent years. Initially starting with just two courses, the institution has progressively added eleven more courses over the last five years,

reflecting its commitment to broadening educational opportunities. This expansion is reflected in the student enrollment figures, which grew from 621 to 932 in the academic year 2021-22. Notably, the college stands out in Mumbai for offering unique programs such as the Self Help Group Program, Diploma in Statistics, Diploma in Environmental Science, and MSc in Environmental Science, distinguishing itself with these exclusive offerings. In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the college adeptly transitioned to online learning. During the 2020-21 academic year, the college conducted 32 online certificate courses that benefited 2,223 students. The following year, it offered 18 online courses that reached 2,187 students. This adaptation underscores the college's ability to meet the evolving needs of students and maintain educational continuity during challenging times. Additionally, the college has registered itself as a nodal center for online courses provided by IIRS-ISRO, where 94 students participated in three online programs. The college has a functional MoU with TISS-NUSSD, delivering five diploma programs online during the lockdown, further showcasing its capacity for innovation and collaboration. These achievements highlight the college's dedication to expanding access to education through both traditional and online platforms, as well

They also collect the necessary documents for Voters Registration and issue the voters card accordingly. Issues regarding the rectification of the discrepancies in the voters ID is also looked up by the concerned officers from the Election Office. Students volunteers also organised a rally to raise the awareness about the importance of voting among students and the community.

Response:

Curriculum planning

The College is affiliated to the University of Mumbai and thus it follows the prescribed curriculum and arrangements of terms for every academic year put forth by the University of Mumbai.The college ensures that all teaching and learning processes are meticulously planned, executed, and documented. These processes are regularly reviewed and updated based on stakeholder feedback. Additionally, detailed documentation of non-academic activities is also carried out annually to maintain comprehensive records.

Academic Calendar:

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell prepares the academic calendar by incorporating inputs from all Heads/Coordinators of departments and committees. This calendar is based on the University of Mumbai's arrangement of term. The academic calendar is communicated through the college website. All the HODs/coordinators ensure that the syllabus is properly taught and completed before the semester end examination.

Departmental Meeting:

Heads of each department conduct departmental meetings with their colleagues to plan and prepare the class wise and faculty wise Timetable for lectures, practicals and tutorials and for various activities of each semester. Also, Teaching Plans are prepared by all the faculties for each class and subject.

Time Table:

The Time-Table Committee of the College prepares timetable by taking into consideration the student strength, the various subject combinations and the complexity of the discipline. The Time-Table is displayed on Notice Boards, College website and circulated in Students What's App Group.

Orientation/Induction Programme:

An orientation programme is conducted for the new batch of students to acquaint them with the curriculum. During COVID it was conducted Online.

Teaching Plan:

Teaching plan and its execution helps the Principal and Heads of Department to monitor and ensure that the schedule of curriculum delivery is being systematically followed as per the time table and the academic calendar.

Remedial Lectures, Bridge Course, Mentor Mentee Program:

Faculty members make themselves available after class hours to clear the students' doubts, even while adhering to the practice of clearing most doubts and queries during class itself. For slow learners, remedial lectures with focus on addressing the specific learning needs of the learners in question are arranged. Classroom Interactions, Attendance and Performance in Internal Assessment help us to identify slow learners and advanced learners. Bridge Courses at the entry level are conducted. Mentorship Sessions are also organized.

Expert Lectures

Expert lectures are designed to complement and enhance the academic content covered in the classroom, offering real-world perspectives, current developments, and practical applications of theoretical concepts.

Contribution to University:

Faculty Members work as paper-setters, chairperson in syllabus framing committees, examiners, Academic Council Member, members and Chairperson in Board of Studies at University of Mumbai.

Feedback:

Feedback from students, parents, teachers, alumni, and employers is collected and analyzed. The data procured, thus, becomes a part of the procedure through which amendments are made to infrastructure and facilities under the IQAC.

Continuous Internal Assessment:

Continuous Internal Assessment for monitoring the progress of students is done in class through quizzes, group discussions etc. whereas internal assessment is also carried out as per university curriculum through project, assignments, class tests etc.

2.3.1

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

Response:

The Vision and Mission statement of the College **emphasizes student-centric learning processes**which is an educational approach that places the students at the center of the learning experience. To ensure that syllabus is imparted effectively, **student – centric methods of instruction are adopted.** These methods aim to foster critical thinking, creativity, and lifelong learning skills. Through the use of **flipped classrooms, collaborative learning, and modern technology,** we have create an interactive and supportive learning environment.

Experiential learning:

The college offers experiential learning to ensure students **gain practical, hands-on experience alongside theoretical knowledge.** Our programs which include **internships, fieldwork, laboratory sessions, and simulations that mimic real-world scenarios, hands-on and field experiences** are provided to the learners through various disciplines. This approach **bridges the gap between classroom learning and real-life applications,** preparing students for a professional environment and enhancing their problem-solving and decision-making skills.

Participative learning:

Participative learning is an educational approach that emphasizes active involvement and collaboration among students in the learning process. Seminars, competitions and guest lectures, workshops, symposia, and debate competitions, Competitions for writing essays and poems etc. are conducted for students thereby providing them a platform for self expression, Students are assigned with case studies, presentations, newspaper reading session, role plays, field study visits, live assignments etc.

Problem Solving Methods:

The teachers at the institution have initiated the implementation of the problem-solving method in their teaching pedagogy through the **discussion of case studies**, **assignments**, **internal tests**, **project under Foundation Course paper at the B. Com level as well as specialization projects under BMS** (Marketing & Finance), BAF (Accounting and Finance), B.Sc. (Computer Science), M.Com (Advanced Accountancy), M.Com (Business Management), M.Sc. (Chemistry), M.Sc.(Physics). The institution also conducts semester-wise remedial lectures for academically weak students. These lectures helps in improving the learners' academic performance. This method encourages active **participation**, **critical thinking**, **and collaborative learning**. **Case study and Assignments** are allotted to the students regarding real life experiences wherein the students are encouraged to give alternate solutions.

Teachers provide personalized attention to students in groups of 20 to 30 during practical sessions in all Science subjects as well as in tutorial sessions for Mathematics, Statistics and Communication Skills. This approach enhances **students' analytical and critical thinking skills.** Additionally, the diverse teaching methodologies employed by teachers offer hands-on learning experiences and foster a sense of social activism and responsibility among students.

ICT Tools:

Information and Communication Technology (ICT) tools are widely used in teaching to enhance the learning experience and improve educational outcomes. The institute aims to improve teaching and learning through the use of ICT resources, such as **digital infrastructure**, which includes smart classroom computers, laptops, and projectors, as well as software applications, such Google Classroom, Google Meet, Google Form, Quizzes, and YouTube videos. The Colleges has also provided institutional Email ID to teachers.

Academic updates related to lectures, examinations, and **co-curricular activities are communicated via** WhatsApp Group messages and the institution's website, facilitating the smooth functioning of the teaching and learning process.

The answer sheet are properly masked before evaluation and thereafter evaluated under **Centralized Assessment Program (CAP)** within the college premises for first year and second year degree classes and for Final year degree classes, the evaluation of answer booklets is conducted using the **Onscreen Marking System (OSM)** as prescribed by the University of Mumbai.

The purpose of examinations is to motivate students to achieve enhanced performance and ensure a fair evaluation for each individual. Resorting to unfair practices during examinations is a punishable offense. Students are monitored through **CCTV cameras installed in the classrooms**. An **Unfair Means Committee, composed of senior teachers oversees these matters.**

3.2 Innovation Ecosystem

Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations, Indian Knowledge System (IKS), including awareness about IPR, establishment of IPR cell, Incubation centre and other initiatives for the creation and transfer of knowledge/technology and the outcomes of the same are evident

Response:

The College has an active research cell and has framed its own policies for conducting high quality research work. The college encourages all its faculty members and students to do research in their respective subjects and also work in collaboration and carry out interdisciplinary research work. They are also motivated to submit project proposals, to apply for fellowships, to file patents and present papers at national and international level conferences. This is evinced from the sanctioned projects; patent awarded and published papers in different subjects. The research cell also focuses on novelty in the research work and has also subscribed an anti-plagiarism software to monitor it. The College has a spacious common facility center well equipped with sophisticated instruments for carrying out research in all branches of science. In addition to this, all arts, science and commerce have their own research cells & 21 laboratories including research labs & 7 Computer labs. State Governmenthas sanctioned Rs.1.69 crore for a new Computer center facilitating the teachers as well as students to work on their research problems. Arabian, Persian, Urdu courses

are being offered in our college to practice the Indian knowledge system. The college has a tradition of preserving the ancient knowledge and exploring the historical developments in those subjects. Students also take interest in Vedic mathematics, Indian Astronomy, Understanding of heritage monuments, Indian medicinal plants, Indian economy, Indian constitution and other subjects in the form of assignments, field work, study tours and seminars. The Gene-bank Sequence type (Nucleotide) have been submitted by Department of Biotechnology & Botany to NCBI database.

The amount of Rs.1.70 crore is sanctioned by the State Government for a new Incubation Centre in our college that will invite, nurture new ideas from all the stakeholders and transforms the ideas into an innovative product. This is noticed from the science projects presented by the science students on the National Science Day every year and their active participation in Conferences, RSM, Avishkar competitions. The poetry creation and creative writing published by our students in college magazines and competitions also reflects this. Students of commerce have published their own books with ISBN numbers that are available for sale on a leading e-commerce platform Amazon and few of them have initiated their own start-ups. The business started by our student is registered with Udyam portal.

There are 26 linkages established with reputed various agencies. To mention few of them are link women project (for woman empowerment), Kotak finance company (finance educational research), GCC (Hands on training), Tata Institute of Social Sciences (certificate courses), Universal School of Creative arts (Skill based Certificate course), Antarang Foundation (Career Orientation), Keshav Shrushti (Research in Herbal products), Anchrome India & Lab india (Research Instrumental Facilities) and Khet Adhar (Green Initiatives). All these collaborating agencies are working in unison to boost up the research culture and to foster creative ideas. About the Library

Location: College library is located on the ground floor at two different buildings: Main building and Bhasha bhavan. It is centrally located and easily accessible. College has number of reading spaces facility in the library: a well-ventilated reading hall with ample light in the main building library unit, a comfortable seating zone facing to greenery of the campus in the Periodicals section, a warm seating area in the Urdu section, and a small seating area in the Bhasha bhavan section. Thus, total seating capacity for reading is approximately 150. The library facility is also sometimes made available to other students residing locally.

Collection: Library is enriched with vast books collection on different subjects and in many languages such as Arabic, English, Gujrati, Hindi, Marathi, Persian, Sanskrit and Urdu. It acquires more than 50 journals and magazines and 9 daily newspapers in 4 languages. It has well equipped E-Resources section with 12 computers connected to internet, a printer and a scanner for students and faculty. It uses iSLIM which is an Integrated Library Management Software. Library has scanned and stored digitized copies of old accession registers, college prospectus, approximately 915 rare books and around 50 of the old 'The Palms' college annual magazines dating back from 1939 with its own digital scanner.

Library also subscribes to N-LIST database facilitated by INFLIBNET which is available to faculty and students after formal registration.

Facilities: Facilities in the Library include Wi-Fi in the main reading hall, semi-automated circulation of books, computers with internet, document scanning and printing, competitive books section etc. Library staff orients students as and when required. Library website is linked to the college website which informs about the rules, library staff, facilities, activities, useful downloadable forms and informative websites. It also prints and distributes college Identity cards for all staff and students. There is a WhatsApp Library group for students on which Librarian and some teachers post useful information about news, courses, events and job vacancies for students.

Activities: Library organizes activities to promote reading culture among students for their personal growth. It has 'Aaj ki Baat' a weekly interactive activity presented voluntarily by students based on recent news or articles of interest to them to express and share their thoughts on it. It celebrates Reading Inspiration Day on 15th October by organizing students talks on their favorite books or authors or on their reading habits to commemorate birthday of our visionary former President Dr APJ Abdul Kalam. Last year 'Festival of Books' was jointly organized with the department of History. It included Book review presentations, Story or poetry writing, making Book-marks and posters on reading themes. Library also organizes On the Job Training for MA students and Earn and Learn scheme.

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1

The institutional governance and leadership are in accordance with the vision and mission of the Institution and it is visible in various institutional practices such as NEP implementation, sustained institutional growth, decentralization, participation in the institutional governance and in their short term and long term Institutional Perspective Plan.

Response:

Owing to the location, college is surrounded by huge population from socioeconomically disadvantaged section. It's a vision, Mission and goal of the college to impart quality and value-based education ensuring the holistic growth of students. The college begins its academic year by welcoming students and preparing them for various aspects of curriculum delivery and examinations. Induction programs are held for first-year students to familiarize them with the college's facilities and resources. When the mode of teaching shifted from offline to online and then from online to offline, the college took proactive measures to ensure a smooth transition. Special sessions were organized to help teaching staff and students adapt effectively to this change.

To foster holistic development, the college places a strong emphasis on co-curricular and extracurricular activities. These activities are designed to help students develop various skills beyond the academic realm. Annual cultural and sports events, along with sensitization programs organised by NCC, NSS, DLLE, WDC and other teaching departments with the help of NGO's and local Police department, provide students with opportunities to explore new interests, discover their strengths, and cultivate a well-rounded personality. Organizing and participating in these activities also enhance leadership skills, decision-making abilities, and a sense of responsibility. Such experiences are invaluable in building confidence and preparing students for future leadership roles.

The college had a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the Tata Institute of Social Sciences under their TISS-NUSSD program from 2019-20 to 2022-23 to offer various soft skills and skill enhancement courses conducted by external experts. Additionally, the college serves as a nodal center for IIRS-ISRO online courses, benefitting over 300 students.

The college Principal plays a crucial role in constituting statutory and non-statutory committees, which are appointed at the beginning of each academic year based on faculty members' core competencies, commitment, and aptitude. These committees include Administrative, Financial, Academic & evaluation, Sports, and Cultural committees, each led by a Chairperson. The purpose of these committees is to decentralize responsibilities and ensure effective management. Each committee's role is clearly defined and discussed during meetings, with members encouraged to provide feedback for continuous improvement.

Curricular responsibilities are managed by the Heads of Departments, who oversee the distribution of syllabi, preparation of timetables, allocation of teaching topics, and assessment papers. They are also responsible for requisitioning books, consumables, and equipment, as well as addressing any infrastructure maintenance needs within their departments.

Students are actively involved in organizing cultural, sports, and extracurricular activities, which helps them to develop confidence and leadership skills. Under the guidance of committee members and faculty, students are entrusted with the planning and execution of these events, which provides them with practical experience and enhances their overall development.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1

The institutional perspective plan is effectively deployed and functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment, service rules, and procedures, etc

Response:

The college aspires to achieve Autonomous Status and earn the College with Potential for Excellence (CPE) designation by excelling in both academic and infrastructural development. To realize this ambition, the college has outlined a strategic approach involving both long-term and short-term goals keeping in mind cost per student and sustainable growth of the College.

Currently, the college serves over 3,000 students across UG, PG and PhD programs distributed among 23 departments. To ensure smooth coordination and effective management, coordinators have been appointed for Arts, Commerce and Science streams. These coordinators play a crucial role in addressing and resolving issues through meticulous planning, regular coordination, periodic meetings, and follow-ups. The Faculty Coordinators communicate these matters to the Principal, who provides further directives as necessary.

Day-to-day operations are managed by more than 50 statutory and non-statutory committees, which include teaching and non-teaching staff, alumni, students, parents, industry representatives, and NGO partners. The college is governed by Ministry of Higher Education, Government of Maharashtra, and adheres to policies set by various departments, including the General and Administrative Department (GAD), Higher Education, Finance Department, and the Directorate of Higher Education, Pune. Recruitment of faculty is overseen by Maharashtra Public Service Commission (MPSC), and appointments are made based on MPSC recommendations. Non-teaching staff recruitment and service rules are managed by the Joint Director of Higher Education (JDHE) and Directorate of Higher Education (DHE), while promotions for teaching staff are handled by DHE with GRs issued by the Ministry.

Regular feedback from alumni, students, parents, employer and faculty, as well as suggestions from previous NAAC peer reviews, are critical inputs for the college's planning process. These inputs are

carefully analyzed and discussed by the Principal, Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), and HoDs to drive continuous improvement.

The college is committed to incremental growth in both academic and infrastructural facilities. As a government institution, it submits an annual perspective plan to the District Planning Committee, Mumbai Suburban Office, detailing requirements for new equipment, machinery, and civil works. This list is finalized based on necessity, priority, and fund availability, with input from all HoDs.

Since 2018-19, the college has received grants totaling Rs 32.28 crore for infrastructure development, excluding salaries. These funds have enabled the acquisition of high-end precision instruments, including XRD, HPTLC, GC-MS, and FTIR. Additionally, the college has invested in a 140 kW solar power generation capacity. Ongoing projects include the construction of new labs, a Computer Centre, Reading Room, Skill Development Centre, and an Incubation Centre.

Routine audits by Accountant General (AG), DHE, JDHE, and other auditing bodies ensure that procurement and accounting procedures are properly verified and validated. To support academic growth, the college has successfully launched five new postgraduate courses and established a PhD Centre for Zoology. Furthermore, the college has digitized all aspects of student interactions, including admissions, examinations, and results, by introducing new features on its website and mobile app. This move towards digitalization enhances accessibility and efficiency, aligning with the college's strategic goals for academic and infrastructural excellence.

The appraisal forms are to be filled, reported, reviewed and preserved as per the Government of Maharashtra GR CFR 1210/P.K. 47/2010/13 dated 1st November 2011. After 2022-23, appraisal of teaching staff is done on Online mode. The electronic Annual Performance Appraisal Report (SPARROW) is an online system based on the comprehensive performance appraisal dossier that is maintained for each member of the Service by the Maharashtra State Government. The aim of this system is to facilitate the electronic filling of Performance Appraisal Report (PAR) by Teaching Staff in a way that is not only user friendly but also allows to fill from anywhere anytime as per their convenience. Similar convenience is available to the officers at different Stages in the workflow hierarchy of filling and submission process. The system is reduces delays in submission of completely filled PARs. All staff members get gov.in email ID's to log on to the MAHA-PAR-SARROW online appraisal system. Principal verifies, validates and submit the form in the capacity of Reporting officer. These forms are then forwarded to Directorate Office by the system and the Director further verifies these forms in the capacity of Reviewing Officer. Appraisal forms contains all important information related to teaching, learning, evaluation, results, administrative responsibilities, achievements, difficulties encountered and future plans of the faculty members. These CR (Confidential Report) are very important at the time of CAS and for any additional administrative responsibility in government.

Appraisal forms for non teaching staff (Class II and III) are verified and validated by Principal in the capacity of Reporting Officer. Joint Director, Higher Education is the Reviewing Officer for the same.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

The College is administered by the Government of Maharashtra and all permanent employees receives salary from the government. Non salary grants for day to day expenditure and infrastructural development are received from District Planning Committee (DPC), Directorate of Higher Education (DHE) and the Rashtriya Uchchatar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA). At the beginning of each financial year, the college submits a detailed annual perspective plan to the DPC, outlining its needs for physical infrastructure, equipment, machinery, and office expenses. This plan is developed with input from all Heads of Departments and is finalized based on necessity, priority, and available funds. The Principal represents the college in meetings with funding agencies to justify the financial demands raised.

Consistently, since 2018-19, the College has received non salary grants of more than 32 crore rupees for infrastructure maintenance and development. In addition to government funding, the college operates selffinanced courses such as BAF, BMS, BSc in Computer Science, BSc in Biotechnology, and M.Com. The salaries and other expenditures for these courses are covered by the fees collected from students. Being a Government Institution, Financial audits are routinely carried out as per the established norms of Government of Maharashtra. Auditors from Auditor General (Audit), Pay and Account Office (Audit), Stock valuation audit, Bhandar Padtalni, Vetan Padtalni and Joint Director Higher Education office, conducts audit regularly as per their schedule and time intervals. The audit procedure begins with verification of physical assets and cash book, emphasis is given on checking on authorization and approval. Specific emphasis is given on accounting records of statutory (PLA) compliances and payments of TDS, GST and GPF. The objections raised during the audits are responded within the stipulated time. The stock verification is carried out by every year especially by the Science Departments to assess the stock of consumables like chemicals, glassware, class work material and to verify the status of equipment's and machinery. Internal stock verification is carried out at the departmental level and finally certified by the Principal. This activity helps during placing the requisition for next academic year.

7.2.1

Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual

Response:

1.Title: Miyawaki Urban Dense Forest

Objectives of the Practice:

To implemented an innovative Miyawaki Urban Dense Forest project in the campus based on the Japanese Miyawaki technique, known for creating dense, native forests in urban. areas in a short period.

The Context:

The green cover in the campus has significantly decreased after creation of Joggers Track.

There was an urgent need to undertake afforestation on large scale. Department of Botany has initiated innovative concept of Dense Urban Forest based on Japanese technique of Miyawaki Forest to increase the green cover. The high cost in implementation was proving to be a major deterrence for such initiative hence the funding options under CSR activities were explored. HDFC Life agreed to fund the project under their CSR activities.

The Practice:

1. Implementation and Planting:

More than 1250 saplings of 32 native tree species were planted in approximately 2000

square feet of college premises. The project was executed on August 22, 2019, under the CSR (Corporate Social Responsibility) scheme of HDFC Life.

2. Ground preparation:

The ground was prepared by removing the stones/debris up to three feet.

Green manure and compost was used as the fertilizers.

No chemical fertilizer/pesticide was used.

3. Irrigation

A water tank of 5000 L capacity was installed at a height of 15 feet and water was pumped through the college well.

Drips were laid throughout the plantation area.

De-weeding exercise was also carried out regularly to get rid of unwanted plants.

Evidence of Success:

Within a year of planting, the saplings grew to a height of more than 6 feet, demonstrating robust growth and health due to the Miyawaki technique's intensive planting and nurturing methods.

The rapid growth and lush appearance of the forest highlight its effectiveness in creating a dense green cover in an urban setting.

The Miyawaki Urban Dense Forest project at Ismail Yusuf College is recognized as one of the exemplary initiatives in the city aimed at enhancing green spaces and biodiversity.

t serves as a model for sustainable urban forestry, showcasing how densely planted native species can thrive and contribute to environmental sustainability.

The College has planned to undertake similar Miyawaki plantation on large scale.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

Getting CSR funds is a major issue.

+ The plantation site gets quickly covered with weeds due to availability of nutrition.

Regular site visits required.

Title: Firing Range & Obstacle Track

The College has one of the oldest NCC Corps in Mumbai. Many cadets take up uniformed services bringing great laurel to the College and the community as a whole. Ismail Yusuf College is the only College in Mumbai with Modern Shooting Range for NCC Students. No other college has such facility for NCC Cadets. Creation of such facility will motivate and help to bring out the best from the cadets.

Objectives of the Practice:

To acknowledge the need of NCC cadets for advanced training facilities, the college has introduced a state-of-the-art Shooting Range and Obstacle Track exclusively for NCC students. The College is the ONLY institution in Mumbai providing these specialized facilities in the same campus.

The Context:

Ismail Yusuf College was among the list of colleges where NCC Corps was introduced for the first time

in Mumbai. The college has one of the oldest NCC Corps running successfully in Mumbai. NCC division has significantly contributed in producing cadets who excel in uniformed services, bringing honor to both the college and the community. Recognizing the importance of providing advanced training facilities, the college has established a modern Shooting Range & Obstacle Track.

The Practice:

1. Modern Shooting Range

The college has developed a state-of-the-art 25 M Shooting Range dedicated to NCC cadets. This facility includes modern equipment and infrastructure designed to enhance marksmanship skills and precision shooting.

Having exclusive access to a Shooting Range enables cadets to train effectively and

participate in shooting competitions with confidence and competence. NCC Cadets fire by .22 &.33 rifle on 1x1 target at the distance of 25 m. NCC Battalion is in charge of getting the rifles & ammunition from their headquarter. FIRST Mumbai College to have such facility

3 MAH & 5 MAH Battalion are regularly conducting their selection round for Shooting Competitions.

The institution also actively celebrates national festivals and cultural days, inculcating a sense of patriotism and respect for diversity. Programs on constitutional values, human rights, and gender sensitivity help students become conscientious citizens who are aware of their societal roles and responsibilities.
